

FUND STRATEGY

The Tocqueville Phoenix Fund will seek to achieve its objectives by investing primarily in the equity securities (i.e., common stocks, securities convertible into common stocks or rights or warrants to subscribe for or purchase common stocks) of domestic companies. Specifically, the Fund will primarily invest in equity securities which the portfolio managers believe to be undervalued or to represent special situations. An example of a special situation is a company undergoing change that might cause its market value to grow at a rate faster than the market generally.

QUARTERLY UPDATE

- U.S. stocks rebounded meaningfully in the first quarter of 2019. President Trump delayed an anticipated increase in tariffs on Chinese imports and markets rallied on hopes that a resolution to the U.S./China trade war may be more likely. A deceleration in the rate of growth in the U.S. economy prompted the Federal Reserve Board to delay any incremental rate hikes for the time being, further encouraging investors. In addition, fourth quarter earnings reports were generally in-line or slightly better than expected, which seemed to embolden market bulls despite the more cautious forward outlook issued by a number of companies.
- The Tocqueville Phoenix Fund returned 11.27%, trailing the Russell 2000 Index by about 331 basis points and the S&P 500 Index by about 238 basis points. While we were active in deploying cash reserves following the fourth quarter market decline, the Fund's cash position during the first quarter accounted for essentially all of its underperformance relative to the Russell 2000 Index gain of 14.58%.
- Among the Fund's more heavily weighted sectors, it experienced the strongest absolute performance in its Information Technology holdings, followed by Industrials and Materials. The Fund's significant underweight to the Energy and Health Care sectors cost it roughly 300 basis points relative to the Russell 2000 Index.
- TTM Technologies was the top contributor in the first quarter, followed closely by Flex Ltd. and PVH Corp. In contrast, Greenbrier Companies, Inc., Newell Brands Inc., and Louisiana-Pacific Corp. were the largest detractors.
- We initiated several new positions during the quarter, the most substantial of which included Greenbrier Companies, Inc., Loews Corporation and Louisiana-Pacific Corp. We also exited several positions, including Ducommun Incorporated, Hanesbrands Inc., and Minerals Technologies Inc.

FUND OBJECTIVE

The Tocqueville Phoenix Fund's investment objectives are to seek long-term preservation of capital (sufficient growth to outpace inflation over an extended period of time) and growth of capital.



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GLOSSARY OF TERMS

P/E: The weighted average of the price/earnings (P/E) ratios of the equity securities referenced. The P/E ratio is calculated by dividing the current price of the stock by the trailing earnings per share for the past 12 months.

The Russell 2000 Index consists of the smallest 2000 companies in a group of 3000 U.S. companies in the Russell 3000 Index, as ranked by market capitalization.

The S&P 500 Index is a market-value weighted index consisting of 500 stocks chosen for market size, liquidity, and industry group representation. You cannot invest directly in an index.

The Morningstar Small-Value Portfolios invest in small U.S. companies with valuations and growth rates below other small-cap peers.
